Message from the Walberswick Common Lands Charity

Our normal approach to potential beneficiaries is responsive, we respond when they to come to us. In these abnormal times we have now adopted a proactive approach:

- 1. A Covid-19 team has been established under the chairmanship of Hannah Sutton. The other members are Brian Fisher, Kate Goodchild and Rita Woodcraft. Their job is to identify those who may be vulnerable and reach out to offer assistance. Any assistance is entirely confidential, only those four Trustees will know who has been supported. - 2. Hannah and her team are liaising with other groups and individuals in the Village who are providing support, plus the Sole Bay Care Fund, to help ensure no-one 'falls through the cracks'.
- 3. The closure of the outreach Post Office, which is supported by the Charity, means some people may not be able to obtain cash. If this is a problem please contact me at james.darkins@anzac.co.uk or 01502 722110. The Charity may be able to assist you with banking.
- 4. If there is any other support you believe the Charity could provide, please email our Clerk, Matthew Wetmore at clerkwclc@gmail.com

Finally, the Heritage Hut restoration, which was due to commence on 30 March, has been postponed. The Hut Management Committee was very conscious of the negative impact these decisions have on small contractors and the self-employed. They reluctantly concluded the potential Covid-19 risk to workers; plus the risk a part-finished building could be exposed to the elements if sites were closed, was too great.

Village Post Office Service closed

The Post Office service in the Village Hall Annexe has closed until further notice.

As of Monday, 30 March, the Post Office in Southwold will offer essential services only at the following times:

Monday, 30 March: 10am - 1pmWednesday, 1 April: 10am - 1pm

Monday, 6 April: 10am - 1pm

Wednesday, 8 April: 10am - 1pm

Do not visit Sole Bay Health Centre unless they have given you permission to do so

The advice from the surgery remains the same as before. Phone in advance and do not visit the surgery unless invited to do so. Prescriptions can be collected from the dispensary window.

Only emergency dental treatment available

Most dental surgeries are now only offering appointments for emergencies.

Vets are offering reduced services

Vets are reducing both opening hours and staff on duty. Routine appointments have been suspended. Urgent or emergency cases will, of course, be seen as soon as possible. Repeat medication can still be ordered.

Garden waste collection suspended and recycling centres closed

The collection of garden waste has been suspended. When collections recommence, subscriptions will be 'rolled over', which means that a new annual payment will only be required once households have received their full quota of collections.

Black and blue bin collections are not affected and will be collected as normal.

All waste recycling centres are closed, including the ones at Leiston and Lowestoft.

Thank you for cleaning up the road into the village

A big thank you to Håkan Brewitz and Guy Parry who recently litter picked the B1387 from the stables to the village. They collected 12 big black bags of rubbish, including three empty 5-litre containers of cider vinegar, various car parts and far too much fast food packaging.

Message from the Rev Simon Pitcher

At this time, all of our certainties have been threatened by the critical global state of affairs that we find ourselves in. As the country faces a deeper lockdown, as people are advised to stay at home and stay safe, many are worried about their health, about jobs and finances and the well-being of us all. In the Bible the prophet Ezekiel has a vision of a valley of lifeless dry bones. The story can be found in Ezekiel Chapter 37 verses 1-14. It seems a very fitting image for a world troubled by the coronavirus, an image of things drying up, lifeless and hopeless.

In the dream, the Lord God asks Ezekiel if he believes that these scattered bones can live. In reply, the prophet trusts God that new life is his gift. "O Lord God, you know." The Lord breathes his life giving Spirit over the bones, and with a rattling sound the bones come together, flesh and sinew covers them and the Lord breathes life into a great multitude of people.

This is a vision of all things made new, a vision of God's healing, enabling life giving Spirit. It has been an extraordinary coincidence that during our days of lockdown the spring weather has been beautiful. New life is evident in creation as pollution levels drop, as the fresh air is clean to breathe, as flowers spring up and new leaves bud upon the trees.

Ezekiel's vision is of a God who blesses with new life, who raises us up from the experience of dryness and death, into a people who learn to live as God's people once again. Coronavirus will not last for ever. We will emerge from the experience with a new wisdom and understanding, that life is fragile and precious, and with the evidence that the human spirit is at its best when we care for one another.
