Working together to address anti-social behaviour

The easing of lockdown brought relief as families and friends reunited and life began to feel more 'normal'. At the same time, Walberswick has suffered from a spate of anti-social behaviour including wide-scale littering, burning the beach grass and fences, illegal camping, and the like. The only 'comfort' we can take is knowing that we are not alone. Having reached out to Walberswick's neighbouring towns and villages, we have learnt that we are all wrestling with similar issues. At the village level, we lack the power to address the causes of what has become a nationwide problem caused by a small minority of people. Nevertheless, the Walberswick Car Parks, the Charity and the Parish Council are working together with many people in the village to do what we can to improve our situation.

At the car parks, with the Covid restrictions lifted, there is now full summer staffing. This has helped provide a positive presence during working hours and the wonderful team there works every morning to clean up the litter left from the night before. Private rubbish and recycling collection at Ferry Road has been added to that of East Suffolk Council and this has allowed us to have collection up to 4 times a week. While the village has long benefitted from a few special people who have picked litter off the beach and roadway for years, new volunteers including adults, students and children have also been organised by the Community Support Group. with support from the Charity, to collect litter from the beach and dunes over the summer. They would be happy to have additional volunteers and continue into the colder months. While it is still very challenging, the situation is improving. We hope that with pubs and restaurants open, there will be less picnicking and drinking on the beach and therefore less opportunity for people to leave rubbish behind.

For visitors with camper vans, they are being reminded that **overnight stays** in the car parks are not allowed. With campgrounds in our area and across the country now open, hopefully there is less reason for people to flout the rules. Signs are also going up in the carparks to let people know that there are public loos behind the Village Hall.

The Charity has a new project to **regenerate marram grass** and thereby protect the dunes. An area of the dunes has been fenced off as a trial to reduce trampling

by visitors, with replanting being investigated for the Spring. When the lockdown was first relaxed, some ill-meaning people removed parts of the fence and burnt it. This has been replaced and temporary signs explaining the purpose of protecting the grasses have been added. Permanent signs are being designed to explain to visitors why this fragile environment needs protection. The Car Parks will soon have new banners to encourage kind behaviour towards our beaches.

In terms of **illegal parking** in the village, East Suffolk Council has now taken over responsibility for civil enforcement and is sending parking patrols into Walberswick on a fairly regular basis. They have been issuing parking fines here that should serve as a deterrent. But everyone can help — ESC Parking is encouraging the public to make use of their dedicated online tool where illegal parking can be reported **my.eastsuffolk.gov.uk/service/parking_contravention**

Finally, Suffolk police has confirmed to the Council that the best course of action if you witness **criminal behaviour**, is to report this directly to them either through 101, 999 (if its urgent and ongoing) or through their dedicated form on their website.

Unfortunately, there are no fool proof solutions but hopefully the village organisations, working together with all our residents and visitors, can help protect and preserve our special and beautiful environment'

August is usually fête month


Kay Ungless' fascinating article, which appears in the History Group's recent **newsletter** and which highlights the signs and posters illustrated in the Walberswick Scroll, the watercolour study of every house in the village painted in 1931/32 by John Doman Turner, reminds one that this year we will be missing the fun and excitement of the village fête due to the pandemic. While there is little in the village archives on the history of the fête, it seems fête day has always been lively, as Kay uncovers from deciphering the various posters:

"There is going to be a Fête on August Bank Holiday (31st August 1931) in aid of the Church Restoration Fund and quite a few notices remind residents. It is remarkable that Walberswick is still keeping up this tradition, yet in 1931 it wasn't held on The Green as it is today. It was held in The Stackyard field. It is the poster at the station, copied in meticulous detail by the artist, which gives us a clue "Westons adjoins the Fete Ground" and next to the Tower House we find "Entrance to Stackyard Field". We are told there will be numerous amusements, versions of which we would recognise, prizes, the Wrentham Town Band, children's sports and a tennis tournament at Westons. Westons will also give concerts with well-known London Artistes and the whole day will finish with a grand carnival dance in the Gannon Reading Room."

The People of Millfield Road

This is a book about the people who built and lived in Millfield Road, Walberswick in the first half of the 20th Century.

At Threeways for example, Cecilia Morgan described herself as married but was single, the father of her son Henry having married another woman soon after the boy was born. The writer George Orwell was Henry's tutor. After the Second World War, the arrival of Iris Birtwhistle and her chicken shed art gallery caused trouble because she encouraged her visitors to park in her neighbours' drives. Iris is reputed to have sold early David Hockney drawings for £5 each. Each of the early houses has a story to tell.

Playgrounds update

The playgrounds on the Green and on the Common have reopened in line with the lifting of government restrictions. On the Green, one of the swings has been removed since it was no longer safe due to corrosion. The Council, with generous financial support from our District Councillor, David Beavan, has ordered a new swing set. Due to Covid-19 delays at the manufacturer, replacement will take place in September/October.

Approval of accounts and reports

The Council continues to meet using Zoom. At its meeting on 13 July, the Council approved its internal audit report, financial accounts and the Annual Governance and Audit Report (AGAR) for 2018/19. All Notices of Meetings and documents are publicly available, as usual, on the Village website.

The Council is aware that many of the footpaths around the village are very overgrown. We have alerted the responsible team at Suffolk Highways and are awaiting confirmation of when they will clear the undergrowth.


