GOLD BADGE PRESENTATION TO ARTHUR SHARMAN

Mr Arthur Sharman was presented with the rarely given RBL Gold Badge by Mai Gen J B Dye CBE MC DL at our AGM on the 19th November. At the same time Mr John Farmer, the RBL County Chairman presented Arthur with the County Certificate. Arthur, born at Blythburgh, was brought up in Walberswick. He has followed on where his father Sergeant Major Edward Sharman DCM, one of the founder members of the Branch, left off. Arthur enlisted into the Royal Artillery as a Boy Soldier at the age of 14 and as a junior soldier became a "top" trumpeter. At the beginning of the war he "served the guns" in North Africa until badly wounded during a major German tank attack. He was evacuated back to the UK where he met his wife to be while recovering in Ipswich Hospital. He and his wife eventually set up home in Walberswick. He was Clerk to the Parish Council, Secretary to the RBL Branch, and for over twenty years Secretary and then Chairman of the RBL Service Committee. He is still a Caseworker on that Committee and Vice President of the Branch. With his understanding of computers he continues to produce posters, flyers etc for events throughout the year. He worked with David Shirreff on the book "Suffolk Memories" and latterly, with Pat Wythe to help him, has produced and had published "Further Suffolk Memories". Arthur is a shining example to us all, a most loyal and dedicated member of the Royal British Legion.

NEWS FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL

Following last month's meeting it was reported that Goldline has not been able to get the bus service to Norwich up and running before Christmas because of licensing delays. Messrs K and D Webb met with a Member of the Environment Agency to discuss the erosion of the sand bank, because of loss of marram grass near the beach huts. He was very keen to set up a system and stated that the Environment Agency would help with costs. It would involve fencing and replacing marram grass over a number of years. The Environment Agency has removed an obstruction from the sluice gates which had been causing them to malfunction and they are now operating satisfactorily. The Council received a retrospective planning application for the veranda on East Point which had been constructed for the filming of Iris. Mr Tibbles declared an interest and took no part in the discussion, the remaining councillors had no objection to the application. The Southwold Surgery has requested permission to reduce the number of surgeries to one per week. In addition they wish to change it to Wednesday afternoon's at 2:30 PM. Changing it from Friday to Wednesday would mean that patients requesting drugs would not have to wait until after the weekend to receive them. The Council agreed to consent to this change. Richard Scott requested permission to include images of The Walberswick Scroll in his forthcoming book on the history of artists in Walberswick from 1880 to 2000. The Council unanimously supported the request. The Council also agreed to support the Russian Students visit to Walberswick coordinated by Anne Kiff-Wood and to attend the welcome reception in August 2002. The Council received documents asking if they would support the proposed cycle route from Halesworth to Southwold. Although the councillors had no objections to a route they had reservations about certain points. The junction of Palmer's Lane and the B1387 is quite dangerous and several "near misses" have been reported by residents. The junction of Lodge Road is also precarious for cyclists. The Council was also concerned that if the track at the end of Lodge Road was improved it might encourage motorists to use this route from the "five ways" to Walberswick. The proposed crossing place on the A12 near Red House Farm was also felt to be dangerous. Mr Buncombe reported from the police that three cars had been broken into in November and mobile phones had been taken. John Brentnall

INSPIRATION FOR YOUNG OFFENDERS

BLYTH VALLEY COMPUTER SOCIETY

January's meeting heard a fascinating and often moving talk about the work of Aldeburgh Education, part of Aldeburgh Productions, based at Snape Maltings. Head of Education, Phillipa Reive, showed extracts from a recent project where two very different groups of young people were provided with computers to develop jointly a multimedia installation. Young offenders in the Culford Unit at HMP Hollesley Bay and pupils at Debenham High School swapped video and sound recorded in their own surroundings. Each group then processed them using music and video software with the help of video artists and composers. The results were remarkable but more importantly it provided a chance for the young offenders both to achieve something of their own and to work with others. The prison authorities were most impressed with the beneficial effects and three follow up projects are in hand.

Ash Wednesday is the first day of Lent, and this year it is 13th February. There will be three Eucharists with Ashing on that day (07:30 at St. Margaret's, 10:00 here at St. Andrew's and 19:30 at St. Edmund's) to give us a chance to begin these weeks in a spiritual manner.

Christians traditionally keep Lent as a time for 'spiritual spring-cleaning', as we prepare for the most important week of the year — Holy Week, culminating in Easter Sunday. We are invited to look at the quality of our prayer lives, and of our study of the Faith and to grow in our concern for the poor and needy. Fasting and self-denial, traditional components of a good Lent, are part of our prayer life and can also result in charitable giving, as with our Friday Lent austerity lunches in the Village Hall.

TEMPORARY RESTRICTION OF ACCESS

EAST POINT, FERRY SHORE.

In order to stop the movement of gravel towards East Point we are planning to extend the existing reed bed in front of the house by several yards. Please be tolerant of the temporary posts and warning tape which will be needed to prevent damage to the young plants. Thank you.

NEWS FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL

Since last month the Suffolk Health Authority has informed the Council that surgery services provided to the Village will now take place at 14:30 on Wednesdays. There was just one planning application this month, for alterations to an extension to provide a bay window, a replacement conservatory and kitchen at Dudley Cottage, The Street. There had been no letters of objection and the Council unanimously supported the application. The Queen's Golden Jubilee will take place on 3rd June with a further bank holiday on 4th June. The Council agreed that the Village should mark the occasion. It was noted that for the Queen's Silver Jubilee in 1977 a committee of representatives from various groups in the village had been set up and a programme of events had been organised. It was considered that this would be an excellent idea for organising this year's event. The Council has already received one letter making suggestions for the day's events and is eager to receive further suggestions. (See notice included in this month's News). Among correspondence this month, the Council received a request for permission for two allotment holders to rent two guarter allotments for keeping chickens. The Council had no objections to this request provided the conditions of the Tenancy Agreement for Allotment Gardens were observed. The Council were also informed that only one quarter allotment remains unused. County Councillor Church had written to say £600 has been allocated to the Village from the Locality Budgets to support local projects. The Council will inquire if the money can be used to help with works required to drain the footpath at the end of Stocks Lane. The following suggestions were put forward by the councillors for allocation of some of the money from the covenant of Walberswick Car Parks Limited to the Trust; chippings to refill the area under the swings on the Village Green; repairs to Stocks Lane footpath; a thatched roof to enhance the bus shelter by the church; reinforcements of the sand wall by the beach huts; money towards the Golden Jubilee celebrations. Members of the Council will meet with members of the Trust to allocate the 2001 covenant on Monday 25th February. The next meeting of the Parish Council will be Monday 4th February at 19:30.

REPORT FROM THE VISITOR MANAGEMENT GROUP

Mr Buncombe reported that the Visitor Management Group, consisting of himself, the Chairman, Councillor David Webb, Mr Alan Walpole, Miss Barbara Priestman, and Mrs Jane Gomm, had met four times over the winter period and had recommendations to put to the Parish Council for their consideration. Inspector Shields had attended one of the meetings to discuss traffic problems. The following proposals for parking restrictions were supported by the Council: existing single yellow lines to be extended on the south side of the road between the junction with Lodge Road to opposite the Palmers Lane junction and a new single line to be positioned on the north side between Freud's stables gate and the junction with Palmers Lane. A broken yellow line to be painted outside the Tuck Shop from the existing line to the junction with Manor Close; supported by a 30 minutes parking restriction sign. A meeting will be arranged with Mr Youngman from the Highways Department to discuss these proposals.

The following proposals for monitoring and enforcement were supported by the Council: a new sign at the approach of the Village stating that "Parking Restrictions Apply Every Day"; more Traffic Warden cover to be requested for the coming season; traffic cones to be placed in specific problem areas on busy days; two speed checks to be carried out per year, the checks to be undertaken closer to the entrance of the village than on previous occasions. Inspector Shields has promised increased cover of Traffic Wardens over the coming season. He also noted the proposal for the two speed checks, but could not guarantee that they would be undertaken. Traffic cones can be delegated to an authorised person or authority. Extra cones would be requested for use on the bend opposite the Village Hall. Although disabled parking is not allowed where cones are deployed, they would be strategically placed so that one or two spaces would be made available for disabled parking along the Village Green.

The Council supported the following proposals on refuse and rubbish: larger, or more bins to be acquired for Ferry Road car park; Waveney District Council should be asked if they were prepared to help with beach cleaning activities; more young people (of the right age) to be employed to pick up litter, and over a longer period of time, starting earlier in the day; SCDC should be asked to clear dog bins more regularly during the Season.

The Council supported the following recommendations concerning the impact on the environment: to continue to press for maintenance of the footpaths from The Highways Department and Suffolk Coasts and Heaths; to continue to discourage advertising and promotion of the village as it had reached saturation point.

The Parish Council agreed to endeavour to put the above recommendations in place by the next summer season. Mr Keith Webb thanked the working group, on behalf of the rest of the councillors, for the time and effort they had spent over the winter months discussing the visitor management problems experienced by the Village last year.



NEWS FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL

The meeting was held on Monday 4th February. The Parish Council had no objection to the application for the erection of a conservatory at llanga, Lodge Road. Planning permission has been granted for the erection of a single story extension to the Old Tea Rooms. The Green. Permission has also been granted for the erection of a first floor conservatory and the retention of a detached workshop at Hoistwood House, The Street. Planning permission has been refused for a two-storey extension to Ash Cottage, The Green. It was agreed to keep a check on the footpaths and include them on the agenda on a quarterly basis. Mr David Webb volunteered to monitor the footpaths and report on their condition at the May Meeting. The Council has received a specification and costs for the work to Stocks Lane footpath from SCC. The County Council has asked if the Village would be prepared to contribute £1,500 to the project, the total cost being £3,300 plus VAT. The Council agreed to put the Locality Budget of £600 towards the project. It was also decided to approach Suffolk Coasts and Heaths to see if they could assist with the costs. Mrs Denise Brentnall was re-nominated as Chair of Governors for Yoxford School. Mr Brentnall declared an interest, PC Adams informed the Clerk that the car and freezer thefts, which took place in the Village, have been resolved and the culprits have been imprisoned. The Council agreed to write to Mark Aldridge to thank him and all those involved in the production of the pantomime. As usual, the full and official minutes of this meeting will be posted on the parish notice boards in due course. The next meeting will be on Monday 4th March.



REPORTS FROM 21ST & 25TH 2002

Nigel Hunt was elected Chairman. Barbara Priestman was thanked for her work as Chairman. Kate Goodchild is our representative on the Jubilee Committee. Firebreaks were cleared behind Gorse View and Heath House on the Common. Dyke clearance and corral fencing on the grazing marshes has been completed, a 3 year grazing agreement to be negotiated. Permission was granted for the balcony at East Point to remain. English Nature offered to maintain the bird scrapes this year. Reed bed water levels will be reduced for 6 months to dry out the path to the mill by Dunwich River. The developers at Moorside were asked to remove their sign on the Common and repair the land and road on completion. Permission was given for the original boundary at Fairhaven, Leveretts Lane to be reinstated. Feb 25th. The Parish Council made these allocations from the 2001 car park profits: chippings for safety surface for swings £200, Village Hall grant £2000, mini-bus to Halesworth & Lowestoft £2600, steps by sluice bridge £1600, travel & enterprise scheme £500, Jubilee celebrations £2500, Easter egg hunt £159, Common Lands Trust for relief of need £3500. Parish Council reconstruction of Stocks Lane path £900 and £2500 for the Parish Council's Jubilee thatching of the Church bus shelter. The remaining £10,000 was put in an Environmental Trust Fund to repair and protect the Village for the future. Funding for a chipping machine was refused due to insufficient interest. Clean hardcore is needed for the marsh corall area. Please dump any at the top of the Drift, leaving gateways clear.

RON ENGLISH 1928 - 2002

Ron English of Walberswick, died 17th February 2002 aged 83. Born in July 1918, his father, Robert English, was then fighting in the Great War. 21 years later Ron was called up for WW2. Ron saw the deserts of North Africa, Italy and the horrors of the final days of Hitler's Germany (see Suffolk Memories for more detail). But the war also introduced him to the love of his life and plucked him from Walberswick. He returned to Walberswick briefly to live in 1945 and then as a visitor every year of his life to see his family and enjoy holidays with his wife and son. His father, died in 1968. His mother, Ada, died in 1995 and his brother, Owen, in 1997. The family house built for his grandfather George, remains in the family. Ron was there for the last time in autumn 2001. During that visit he met the son of his long-lost friend Geoffrey Fairs. Ron is survived by sister Peggy (Thetford) and brothers Tony (South Africa) and George (New Zealand). He will also be greatly missed by the good family that embraced him after Dorothy (his first wife and my mother) died in 1970. His second wife, Betty, was with him to the end. The village of Ron's childhood was a different place to the Walberswick of today. From the football pitch on the back of the beach to the large families that worked the boats and fields, most have gone. Economic forces have changed the village throughout history. Those who remember Ron will miss him. But like he did we must look to the future and enjoy the present.

- causing a feeling of isolation

MISS ELSIE BALLY 1908-2002

Elsie Bally came to live in Walberswick in the 1960's and built her bungalow, St. Francis, in virgin land off Stocks Lane. She trained in nursing and midwifery at St Thomas', then worked for four years in the Indian staffed hospital in Patna, returning to work in London throughout the war. She ended her career as head of midwifery services in Lincolnshire, serving on the Royal Council of Nurses and Midwives. Her object in retirement was to give a home to children whose parents worked abroad, but the advent of cheap flights negated the need for holiday homes. Elsie participated fully in Village life, joining many of the societies and becoming a WI member. She was the first to put her money into raising a loan for the building of the Village Hall when the project seemed doomed to failure in the 60's and became the first chairman of the Management Committee. In 1970, when the WI was divided over a move from the Gannon Room into the new Village Hall, she led the Institute into harmony, became president and continued in office until 1973. She led footpath walking parties to keep the local footpaths open, demonstrated crafts to groups around the country and made a wonderful garden. For many years she was on the local committee of the Save the Children Fund and was also a keen supporter of the Marie Curie Nursing Fund, often holding coffee mornings in her house and garden to raise funds. In 1985, during an interregnum, Elsie conceived the idea of forming St Andrews Guild, which still functions today, supporting the parish. She had a wonderful talent for getting people involved, however new they were to the Village. In Elsie's eyes you won your village spurs if you were willing to give a helping hand - a rather splendid legacy to leave behind. Margot Godbold.

THE BLYTH VALLEY COMPUTER SOCIETY

At the April meeting Bruce Gernand, East Anglian sculptor, and Senior Lecturer at the Central St Martins School of Art in London, gave a talk about his use of computer 3D graphics to develop his works. He prints an enlarged "unfold" of the 3D image onto card from which he produces the mould to cast full size pieces which can be over a metre high. The photographs of his works showed that by combining the computer's mathematical logic with his own artistic judgement he creates sculptures that are reminiscent of natural objects such as shells, stones and plants which are also striking and powerful. At the May meeting, Mark Lawrik-Thompson, FRAS, Chairman of the Norwich Astronomical Society, gave a fascinating talk on the value of computer technology to astronomers. Telescopes can zero in on the distant galaxies by highly accurate computer control, fuzzy photographic images can be enhanced and astronomers no longer have to journey to distant mountain top observatories. They can request images of the objects they are studying to be sent over the internet. Mr Lawrik-Thompson illustrated his talk with a selection of breathtaking pictures, many taken by the Hubble space telescope. Retiring chairman Martin Smith was thanked for his three years in office and Piers Ford-Crush was elected the new Chairman. NEWS FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL

The meeting was held on Monday 8th April. The official minutes will be published on the Village notice boards. There was an application to build a bungalow at the rear of Spindrift. Lodge Road. The Council opposed this application, because it represented back land development and was an over-development of a small site. There was also an application for the erection of a two-storey extension to Ash Cottage. The Green. The Council had no objection to the application. Permission has been granted for the erection of a conservatory at the rear of Ilanga, Lodge Road. Permission has also been granted for the erection of a first floor conservatory to Hoistwood House, Lodge Road. After a meeting between the Visitor Management Committee and Inspector Shields, it was agreed that if Walberswick was prepared to sponsor a Traffic Warden then one would be made available for the busiest periods. The cost would be £2,500 - £3,000. Waveney District Council is going to clean part of Walberswick Beach, (approximately from the beach huts to the harbour wall) on a weekly basis. Mr Hunt and Mr K. Webb attended a meeting with a member of the Environment Agency, to discuss the protection of the sand banks in the area of the beach huts. Large areas to the left of the huts are going to be fenced off throughout the summer to protect the marram grass, this will then be re-planted in September. The area to the right of the huts will be fenced off in September and planted with marram grass. Walkways will be put into place to prevent further erosion.

An extra meeting was held on Monday 29th April. There was an application for the erection of a greenhouse at Halsey, Lodge Road, and also an application for the erection of a new detached double garage and pool room at Mulberry House, Mill Field Road. The Council had no objections to either of these applications. All members of the Council signed a new Declaration of Acceptance of Office and the new Ethical Code of Conduct was adopted. The Rural Housing Trust informed the Council of the results of the Housing Needs Survey carried out earlier in the year. They stated that the level of response had been good and acceptable as an indicator of the needs and attitudes towards housing development in the locality. Many households indicated the type of housing, if any, they felt was required in the Village. The comments, in the main, were supportive of the provision of housing for local people. However, the information collected did not warrant a small scheme of properties at present. As nine households would require housing within the next five years, it was recommended that the Parish Council reconsider the matter within the next 18 months. It was agreed to write to the Trust stating that the Parish Council was disappointed that the Trust had decided not to go ahead with the scheme in the Village. Although the requirement for such houses might be minimal at this time, it was very important for the survival of the Village that young people were able to remain here. It was agreed to review the situation in one years time. John Brentnall.

13 May Meeting

A one minute silence was held by members to reflect on the sad death of County Councillor Richard Church who had died suddenly whilst on holiday the previous week. The clerk stated that he had been a very conscientious and hard-working County Councillor and that he would be greatly missed by the Parish Council. Appointments

Mr Hunt was elected as Chairman, and also as representative on the Village Hall Management Committee. Mr Buncombe was elected as Vice-Chairman and as representative to the Suffolk Association of Local Councils. The Chairman reported that Mr Mark Aldridge had agreed to be the new Chairman of the Village Hall Management Committee.

Works Report

The board walk across the marshes at the back of Hoistwood, had now been covered with netting and should be much safer for walkers. The work on the harbour reinforcements had almost been completed. The old swings on the Common needed attention and possibly removing. Mr Hunt thanked Mr Tibbles and Mr Webb for installing the new steps by the sluice bridge.

Planning applications with no objections

The demolition of a single storey flat roofed extension at Knoll Cottage, Leveretts Lane, and its replacement by a larger thatched roof extension.

Village Fete

Mrs King and Mrs Thomson had volunteered to co-ordinate the Village Fete. The council unanimously supported their request to use the Village Green on 24th August 2002

Walberswick Common Lands Charity

The Council supported the registration of land by Walberswick Common Lands Charity.

10th June Meeting.

Mr Buncombe stated that he had attended the funeral of County Councillor Richard Church on behalf of the Council.

Planning permissions granted

The erection of a two-storey extension to Ash Cottage, The Green; the conversion of the garage roof to a loft at Northdale, The Street, and the erection of a new double garage and pool room at Mulberry House, Millfield Road.

Planning permission refused

The erection of a bungalow in the garden of Spindrift, Lodge Road.

Planning applications

A replacement shed and conservatory extension at Byways, Stocks Lane. The Council had no objection to the shed, but opposed the conservatory on the grounds that the design and form of the extension was out of character with the bungalow. The conversion of the outbuildings at The Anchor to tourist accommodation was supported by the Council as it was felt that it would ensure the restoration of the building.

Planning Appeal

The planning appeal of Quietways, Leveretts Lane was attended by six residents from the Village and District Councillor Rae Leighton. During a lengthy discussion Mr Leighton informed the Council that the planning appeal had been upheld. Works Report

The public toilets needed painting and the new door frames did not fit correctly. The roads needed sweeping as the yellow lines were being obliterated and it was agreed to contact the Highways Department. It was also confirmed that Waveney District Council was cleaning its part of the beach twice weekly. Concern was expressed about the use of hooks on crabbing lines. Although warning notices were in the shop, it was agreed to attach notices to fishing line packages and on the huts of the car park attendants. The telephone box had still not been painted and it was agreed to contact BT yet again. The chairman reported that The Golden Jubilee had been a very successful day of which all the Village should be proud. The next meeting will be Monday 1st July 2002.

FROM THE TEAM RECTOR

This is the last article I will write as Team Rector of the Sole Bay Team Ministry. When I accepted this post, six years ago, I was looking forward to the challenge of building up a Team Ministry and it was a joy to be called to do so in such beautiful surroundings.

I have always worked in "teams" of one kind or another and, I believe, this is the best pattern for doing the Lord's work. Proclaiming the Gospel and building the Kingdom is a shared work. It is enhanced by the diversity of gifts we possess and by the spirit of cooperation, rather than competition, which is essential to good team working. It seems to me that the Sole Bay Team Ministry has got off to a good start, though, of course, there have been — and will continue to be — problems on the way. An essential part of good team working is that people respect and value one another in the Lord, even though we may see things very differently. This is the model of working, and going forward, I have attempted to foster. It may not produce results as fast as some other ways of working, but I trust that the results it does achieve will be firmly grounded.

The firmest grounding for any Christian work is prayer and I have sought to affirm an awareness of the centrality of prayer and worship in the Christian life, with the frequent celebration of the Eucharist and the regular recitation of the Offices throughout the Team. As part of my application for this post, I wrote: "The celebration of the Eucharist is at the heart of my understanding of ministry — which is a living out of what happens at the Altar". One of the biggest disappointments for me in my time here, has been my inability to overcome what is, in some people, a lack of awareness of the centrality of eucharistic worship to the Christian life.

A vital component of Christian living is our ability to embrace change – I have often quoted words of John Newman: "To change is to grow, to be perfect is to have changed much". If we do not change then we simply atrophy. Clearly all change is not for good, but this truism should not make us fearful of any change. We have changed over the last five years and we must continue to change, as the work of the Church goes forward. We must live in the present, not in some past time-warp. It is important that change takes place in an atmosphere of trust and security and I believe this is something the Team, as it continues into it's next chapter, will continue to provide. One of the great attractions of my new post in Leicester is to be heading up the Church's involvement in the

transformation of communities in the city centre – to be committed to working for change and simultaneously rooted in the Gospel.

I have valued my time here, I have made some lovely friendships, in the Church and in the wider community, and I have many happy memories to take with me. It has truly been a great privilege to stand at the Altar and serve in our ancient churches, where prayer has been offered for many centuries. I will miss much here but am also looking forward to returning to living in a multi-cultural inner city, with all its blessings and challenges.

With every blessing for the future and with thanks for the many blessings I have received during my years here.


NEWS FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL

The meeting was held on Monday 1st July. The full minutes will be posted on the Village notice boards as usual. The Council received a planning application for an extension at the back of 1, The Terrace. There was no objection to this plan. Planning permission has been granted for the erection of a greenhouse at Halsey, Lodge Road. The District Council has received an application to fell seven beech trees on the boundary of former Mary's Tea Rooms. The District Council considered that these trees had significant value to Walberswick. The Parish Council was horrified and it was agreed to request a preservation order on the trees. Mr David Webb has produced a comprehensive report, detailing the state of all footpaths in the village. He stated that footpaths were all in reasonable condition at the present time and that they had been cut recently. The Clerk has sent a copy of the report to the Highways Department asking them to act where necessary. The next meeting will be on Tuesday 6th August.

JUST WHAT IS AN ANTLION?

Have you ever heard of a "doodlebug"? Well, it's actually an insect called an Antlion. (As mentioned in Jane Tibbles' notes from the Common Lands Trust. Page 3) The Antlion gets its name because it's a voracious predator of ants and other insects. Actually, it's only the larvae that's the predator. They capture ants and other crawling insects which accidentally fall into their circular pits. These pits are usually 1 1/2 to 2 inches in diameter and about the same depth. The Antlion larvae wait at the bottom for an ant or other insect to slip on the loose sand and fall in. As soon as they do, the Antlion has its next meal. In the process of making their pits, Antlion larvae create spiral-shaped trails in the sand. These trails are why they get the nickname "doodlebug", because it looks like someone has been doodling in the sand. Some species hide under debris or wood and attack passing insects. Adult Antlions resemble Dragonflies or Damselflies (order Odonata) and, like Damselflies, they aren't very good at flying. Antlions are easily distinguished from Odonata by their longer, prominent, clubbed antennae and different type of wing pattern. However, compared to other Neuroptera, such as lacewings, an



Antlion's antennae are shorter. The adult is rarely seen in the wild because it is active only in the evening. During the day it rests, motionless, well-camouflaged by its transparent wings and brownish body. The only antlion colonies in the UK are on the Suffolk coast.

NOTES FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL

The meeting was held on Tuesday 6th August 2002. The official minutes will be posted on the Village notice boards. Since the meeting in July, the phone box has been painted, the dog bins have been resited and the Harbour Master has been informed about nets being placed too close to the shore. Work has been carried out on the sports field and pavilion throughout July. The Council also heard that the painting of the yellow lines will take place in September after the main holiday season has finished and that the environmental work planting new marram grass on the sand banks is imminent.

Planning permission has been granted for the retention of the shed and conservatory at Byways, Stocks Lane and for the erection of an extension at 1,The Terrace. Planning applications this month included the erection of a two-storey side extension at Ryecroft, The Street. The Council had no objections to this but expressed concern about sufficient off road parking. There was also an application for the erection of a detached garden room at 3, The Terrace. There were no objections to a garden room being erected, but the application was opposed because it was considered that the proposed garden room was too large and over bearing.

Mr Buncombe informed the Council that despite much advertising, no litter persons were coming forward to help keep the village clean. Mr Brentnall wondered if it was time to reconsider placing bins around the village. The Council agreed that larger bins might be made available at the Ferry Road Car Park, but that smaller bins around the village led to piles of rubbish lying around.

Mr Buncombe stated that he would like to thank the Parish Council and the village for their co-operation over the Crabbing Championship. It had been a very successful day.

The Chairman reported that Mr Harris wished to have the bottle banks removed from The Anchor car park as people were leaving piles of newspaper and other rubbish around the base of the banks making it unsightly. Councillor Leighton reiterated that we did not want to lose the facility. It was agreed that the Chairman should ask Mr Harris to reconsider his decision.

NEWS FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL

The meeting was held on Monday 2nd September. Planning permission has been granted for a one and a half storey rear extension to Knoll Cottage, Leveretts Lane; a two-storey side extension and front porch to Ryecroft, the Street. Permission has been granted for Quietways, Leveretts Lane to use brown stained windows and doors. A planning application has been received for the construction of a dormer window and loft conversion at Threeways, The Street. The council had no objection to this application but considered the window should be leaded to match the existing windows. The Council unanimously supported the proposed preservation order on the beech trees at Manor House and Alexandra Cottage. There has been no progress on the Traffic Wardens for the Village. Mr Buncombe reported that they had attended the Village, but not at busy times. It was agreed that if there was no sign of the promised Village Traffic Warden being set in place for next season by the December meeting, the Council would have to put the matter to a higher authority. The Clerk informed the Council that PC Matt Adams had stated that a new policing system would be set up shortly, whereby mobile officers would be designated to about five parishes. The Chairman has spoken to Mr Harris, Landlord of the Anchor Inn, who is prepared to give the bottle bank a second chance. The situation will be monitored. The Chairman has contacted Mr Peter Austin, Local District Councillor for Waveney about the deterioration of the South Pier of the harbour entrance. He has been assured that engineers from the Environment Agency were currently looking into the state of the South Pier and had recognised that work would have to be carried out in the next few years. The official minutes of this meeting will be placed on the Parish notice boards in due course. The next meeting will be held on Monday 7th October. John Brentnall.

WALBERSWICK BOOKCLUB (mark one?)

A few months ago a group of friends in the Village decided, after much talking about it, to look into starting a book club. We contacted the library service who have a librarian with special responsibility for supporting such groups and discovered that we could have a 'book club library card' which enables us to take out up to ten copies of a book, for two months at a time. The card is held at the library of your choice and books are logged in an out by a named person.

We also collected 'The Book Club Box', a box of information and exercises to use at your first meeting to help you think about what format you want the group to follow, how many members you want to work with, how you will choose the books etc. The exercises were very interesting and got us talking instantly about the types of books we had read, characters we loved and hated, books we have re-read etc. Looking into the information in the box and on-line we decided that we didn't want to go above single figures for the group as much of the guidance and feedback suggests that beyond this discussion becomes increasingly difficult.

We decided to meet on a monthly basis, mainly in each others' houses, but for those of us who find this difficult we meet in the pub when it is our turn and this has also worked well.

We are constantly hearing of people who would like to join the group but don't, at the moment, have any spaces. I have spoken to the library and there is no reason why we can't have any number of book groups in the Village, all with their own cards. If anyone is interested in starting another group and would like to talk to me I am sure that between our group members we already have enough people who have approached us informally to start at least one, if not two, more groups. Maybe we could get together every sixth months or so to do a joint book or have book events in the village hall! WORKOUT WITH EUROLEAN NOSTRAS

The inhabitants of Walberswick created the Common by grazing the impoverished sandy soil over many centuries. Until 100 years ago it was extremely important to the village. In 1795 a flock of 1,600 sheep were recorded in Walberswick and until the early 1900s large flocks of sheep trampled the bracken and nibbled off any young tree saplings, villagers also collected plants for medicines, kindling and building materials, and the rabbits were part of their diet. The Common should be important to the inhabitants of the village today but for a different reason; its features are nationally rare because of the transition from dry heath through wet heath, to a valley head mire, known locally as the fen. These conditions do not exist elsewhere because of modern agricultural activities including drainage, ploughing and fertilizing. The Common forms part of the internationally important Sandlings heaths and is a site of great scientific interest, designated as a SSSI. The U.K. has about 20% of Europe's heathland, and the Suffolk Sandlings represent about 4% of the U. K. total. These wet and dry heathland habitats support a range of specific and rare flora and fauna, and if they are not properly managed they will be lost for ever. There is a constant threat from the invasion of birch, willow, gorse, and bracken, a prolific weed. Nigel Hunt, Chairman of The Common Lands Charity and the Trustees are currently considering a management plan for the Common in conjunction with English Nature. In recent years volunteers from the village have also worked on the Common during the winter months, helping to preserve this unique habitat. This year we meet on Wednesday afternoons at 2.15 in the Church Lane car park commencing on the 6th of Nov. Tools and refreshments are provided. Even if you are not interested in the Antlion, we can provide for no charge relaxing aerobic exercise in the fresh air and beautiful surroundings. THE BLYTH VALLEY COMPUTER SOCIETY

John Bumpus, Head of IT at the Lowestoft CEFAS Laboratory gave us a most informative talk and fascinating insight into the work of The Centre for Environment, Fisheries & Aquaculture Science. Established in 1902, they were the first fisheries laboratory in the world. Now, internationally renowned, they operate on the leading edge of science with extensive international links. Indeed, CEFAS' work has led directly to the recent warnings concerning dangerously low stocks of cod. They support the inspection and control of all live fish movements, monitor shellfish hygiene and design software for animal and fish telemetry, to name but a few of their fields of research and expertise. Linking up to their website via a mobile phone, we were shown real time data from the West Gabard smart-buoy just off Lowestoft, where amongst numerous other data we determined the wave height at the moment of looking to be 2.3 metres! The next open meeting will be on Friday 10th January 2003 at 19:00 with a talk by BT's own futurologist, lan Pearson. All meetings are held in the Village Hall Annex. 

NEWS FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL OCTOBER 2002 MEETING

PC Upson introduced himself as the new Community Police Officer. He will be covering ten villages in the area sometimes on bicycle or on foot patrol. It is hoped that his role will promote confidence amongst villagers who would be reassured by his presence. He is based at Saxmundham and can be contacted via Saxmundham or Leiston

Planning permission has been granted for the erection of a detached garden room at 3, The Terrace, and for the conversion of an out building for tourist accommodation at The Anchor Inn. Permission has also been granted for the felling of a sycamore and the crowning of a lime tree at The Gables, Millfield Road.

Planning applications in October included a linked extension to The Hidden House, The Green. It was felt that this extension was too large and did not respect the style of the original building. A request for a side extension to Kermont, The Street, was supported. The Council was outraged to receive an application for the siting of caravans for the winter months in Southwold. The visual intrusion of this site from the south side of the harbour has been a constant cause of concern for the people of Walberswick, and despite several pleas for some form of screening nothing has ever been achieved.

Mr David Webb and Alvin Hunt attended a public footpaths meeting in September. The main aim of the meeting was to discuss the state of the footpaths. It was agreed to improve the current signing and also to produce small maps to be handed out to visitors showing paths and bridleways that can be used by cyclists. It was pointed out that it is not illegal to cycle on footpaths, but it is trespass. Missing stiles cannot be replaced as they can only be used to control livestock. It was agreed that a board walk should be installed on footpath 20. John Brentnall.
