Walberswick Car Park Company

The eighth year of the Company operating the car parks in Walberswick closed on the 30th of September after another successful and highly satisfactory season. The accounts for the season are in the process of being audited by the Company Accountant. Preliminary results show that, after all expenses, a profit of some £16,000 will be covenanted to the Walberswick Common Lands Charity together with a rent of £4,000. The figure is marginally down on last year entirely due to the indifferent weather during the summer.

We employed over a dozen local people during the season and sold over 32,000 tickets. During the winter months repair and clearance work will have to be put in hand on Cliff Field, parts of which were badly eroded in the wet conditions, and some maintenance carried out on the Ferry Road sites.

The Directors of the Company are currently Ben Cardwell, Mary Clayton, Alvin Hunt, Rae Leighton, David Webb and Michael Vaughan. The Company Secretary is Angela Vaughan and Robin Buncombe is the Operations Manager.

<u>Planning Appeal</u> The Studio, Stocks Lane: has been dismissed by the Planning Inspectorate who concluded that the design and appearance of the two proposed dwellings would be inappropriate on the site and would be harmful to the character and appearance of the area.

Local Issues – The Common Lands Trust and The Village Hall Management would be asked to reconsider siting recycling facilities on their land. The Parish Council felt unable to comment on the suggestion to try and purchase a small part of the allotments for further car parking, until a cost benefit analysis was available.

<u>Traffic Calming</u> measures for the village - see elsewhere. Danger to children caused by cars parking alongside The Green, was also discussed. The possibility of double yellow lines was considered but no decision would be made until further investigations were carried out.

The Council unanimously supported to keep the precept at the same level for 2005-2006.



Lemon Drizzle Cake Recipe

175 grams butter, softened

175 grams caster sugar

2 eggs

4 tbsp milk

175 grams self-raising flour, sieved

Grated zest and juice of one unwaxed lemon

1 tbsp icing sugar

- l Cream the butter and sugar together until light in colour and fluffy. Gradually beat in the eggs and milk.
- 2. Fold the flour into the mixture with the grated lemon zest.
- 3. Spoon the mixture into a greased and lined 900g (2lb) loaf tin.
- Bake at gas mark4, 180 degree C-fan oven, 160 degrees C for 50 - 65 minutes until the cake is golden brown and firm to the touch.
- Mix the lemon juice and icing sugar together and pour over the cake as soon as it is removed from the oven. Allow the glaze to set before removing the cake from the tin. Set on a wire rack to cool completely.

Chocolate Refrigerator Square Recipe

300 grams good quality plain chocolate

4 tbsp golden syrup

100 grams unsalted butter

300 grams pack gingernut biscuits

250 grams mixed dry fruit – chopped if pieces are large.

1. Melt the chocolate, syrup and butter in the microwave (850W) for 1 - 1½ mins., or in a bowl over a pan of hot water. Stir until smooth. Adult help may be needed here.

2. Crumble the ginger nuts into a bowl with your hands (keeping them in chunky pieces). Tip in the fruit, pour in the chocolate and stir until evenly mixed. Spread out in a $27 \times 18 \times 4$ cm tin and leave in the refrigerator until set, at least two hours or overnight. Makes 32 squares.

A limited response had been received regarding the flashing 30 m.p.h. sign to be placed near the entrance to the village. However, on the 24th of January a meeting will take place between the Parish Council and Mr Andrew Carden, from the Highways Department, to discuss the issue. The Parish Council unanimously agreed that they would not support humps in the road, width restrictions, pavements or street lights in any form in Walberswick.

JANUARY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

<u>Planning</u> - The Parish Council had no objections to a kitchen extension at The Bell Inn, but would ask SCDC to ensure that the car parking spaces lost because of the extension be replaced elsewhere in the grounds of the property.

Horse riding – It was reported that horse riders had been seen on the footpaths and riding on the sea defences during the Christmas period. It was felt that the offenders were visitors to the village. Various means were discussed on how to prevent this being repeated.

<u>Suffolk Coastal Against Retreat</u> – Councillor D Webb and R Buncombe attended the meeting which was chaired by the Rt. Hon. John Gummer MP and attended by officers from SCDC. The object of the meeting was their concern about the Government's approach to Coastal Defences and flood control. It was agreed to set up a steering group, linking it to Norfolk and Essex, who would lobby on behalf of the coastal population.

<u>Forthcoming Meetings</u> - Councillors will be attending meetings throughout the month, concerning 'East of England Plan', 'Emergency Planning' and 'The Greenprint Forum'.

<u>Village Amenities</u> – The Council approved replacing the wooden stakes on Stocks Green. A meeting would be held shortly with the carpenter and thatcher to discuss the thatching of the bus shelter opposite Church Lane. A hole in the road outside Taystone House would be reported to the Highways Department.

Traffic Calming Measures — A meeting took place between representatives from the Parish Council, Visitor Management Group, Police and Suffolk Coastal. He considered it was necessary to erect pedestrian signs at the Adams' Lane junction and he also stated that a new mobile flashing sign was being considered for future use. The Blyth Valley Computer Society

Our January speaker, Giles Ford-Crush, is an expert in 3D graphics. Working for an advertising agency, he produces high quality images for the car industry. His is the virtual world of producing photo-realistic stills and movies of cars that have yet to be driven off the factory floor. Without such simulations, car manufacturers would have to produce costly prototypes to photograph for promotional material, advertising and websites. With the realism of photography, these computer animations can show how the suspension of a 4x4 vehicle behaves over rough terrain, the interior of an engine working at full throttle, or the final version rolling through genuine scenery. Using 3ds Max software, Giles showed us some tricks of the trade, the main elements of setting up 3D simulations, and the rudiments of animation. Many of us felt we would never again complain about the slowness of our computers, when we learnt that a short sequence might take 9 days to process! We were intrigued by the particle systems for creating anything from smoke to a school of fish, and a new add-on water simulator enabling floating or submerged objects to float realistically. Giles' work is not confined to the car trade and we were fascinated to be shown excerpts from the simulation of Beagle 2 landing on Mars; the animation being very much more successful than the reality.

February Parish Council Meeting

<u>Planning</u> - Council had no objection to the plans for a new dwelling at Poplar Cottage, The Green but was not in favour of a perfectly adequate building being demolished in a Conservation Area. The Council also opposed the application for the demolition of the existing builders' store and replacement with a building incorporating a shop and games room at Poplar Cottage, as they considered the design and materials were not in keeping with the surrounding buildings.

Council also opposed the erection of a pair of semidetached houses at the Studio, Stocks Lane on the grounds that this would result in over-massing of the site and would be totally out of character with the surrounding area.

Kevin Cornwall is the Director of Global Infrastructure Architecture of Avaya Inc., a company who have grown to specialise in automated answering systems and call centres. His talk entitled 'Broadband and Beyond' is of particular significance to the Southwold area, as broadband will arrive in May. It is simple to install and Kevin demystified the world of broadband by taking us from a basic setup, through security, to the future and its applications. Eager questioners frequently interrupted him, all keen to know what difference it will make to our Internet experience. We were advised to install a security program combining a firewall, anti-virus, anti-spy-ware and anti-spam. The most important advantage of broadband is speed and the ability to be permanently on-line yet able to receive phone calls. It can also provide instant messaging and access to music, radio, TV and videos anywhere in the world. With dial-up, we are lucky if we get as much as 40 Kbs, yet BT and other providers are already offering greater speeds than a few months ago, and the near future promises 100 Mbs. We can look forward to a future enabling multiple devices in our homes. IP telephones. which work via broadband, are already available. Converting voice into data, they are secure and cannot be bugged.

Left only with the AGM and the forthcoming outing to Great Yarmouth Coast Guards, our March speaker rounded up yet another stimulating season for BVCS. Kay Ungless



<u>PLANNING</u> – Opposed: Application at Sea House, 2, The Terrace, to insert a rear dormer and conversion of the roof space to studio, as this would destroy the look of an uninterrupted roofline on the Terraces which are over 100 years old. Also, as this is used as a holiday enterprise, providing an extra room would exacerbate the parking difficulties associated with these houses. (Councillor Buncombe declared a personal interest, left the room, and took no part in the discussion).

No objections: To a cart lodge and summerhouse being erected at Heathwold, Palmers Lane.

<u>Traffic problems</u> – Complaints had been received about the hazard caused by the number of cars parked outside Old Corner House, The Street. It was agreed to write to the owner asking him to resolve this problem.

Road safety for pedestrians – There are still places available for the cycling proficiency course to be held on 14th and 15th May. Please contact the Clerk at St Francis or telephone 723142.



BLYTH VALLEY COMPUTER SOCIETY

Our March meeting was our AGM. Piers Ford-Crush brought his brilliant 3-year chairmanship to a conclusion with an illustrated talk on Internet shopping. We all heartily thank Piers for the hard work he has done during his tenure. In its 12 years, the BVCS has grown from an attendance of six to well over forty for many of its recent meetings. However, as it has become increasingly difficult to find speakers willing to give up their evenings, the BVCS will go into 'hibernation' whilst awaiting suggestions from members.

The 2004/5 Season came finally to a close with our visit to the Maritime and Coastguard Agency in Yarmouth and their operations room. No longer needing to be situated scanning the horizon searching for smugglers, the modern coastguards sit inland, each in front of four touch screens waiting for any emergency to occur at sea, on lakes, rivers, cliffs or mountains. Their main objective is search and rescue, though with satellite navigation 'search' is rarely needed. Even if a vessel does not know its position, they can locate it to within 2° through their sophisticated technology. With the tap of a finger they are able to patch a caller to the expert, perhaps a ship to a hospital for medical instructions. They co-ordinate the other services when an emergency arises, which might be anything from a lamb in the Yare to a major oil spill in the North Sea. The MCA actively promotes safety at sea. They examine the seaworthiness of ships calling at British Ports and visit schools to educate children and parents of the dangers of drifting out to sea on inflatables and airbeds. As for the future, it is probable that only one global operations centre will be needed, situated who knows where - Calcutta?

Doctors Lead The Way In Global Initiatives

Big-hearted GPs in Waveney are leading the way when it comes to helping deliver care to people in countries where medicine and aid are in short supply.

A Kessingland GP and his wife, who started a local arm of a pioneering medicine collection scheme for the third world, are delighted with the response so far.

Seven weeks ago, Dr Nigel Drane, of Field Lane Surgery, and wife Jane started collecting prescription drugs, which had been returned to the surgery by patients.

They had been alarmed that so many medicines were having to be destroyed, as NHS guidelines state returned drugs can not be issued to other patients or reused, and were determined they could be put to some good.

"It seems an awful lot of valuable drugs are going to waste that can easily be used again in other spheres," said Dr Drane. "And then we found the EMMS project which seemed an ideal way of going about it."

Mrs Drane has now collected, sorted, packaged and sent several batches of unwanted prescription drugs and pain-killers to the Christian charity Emmanuel Healthcare (EMMS) to be used by third world patients who so often have no other source of medicines.

Mrs Drane has also organised the collection of drugs from Wangford and Wrentham surgeries and Kessingland Pharmacy. A week ago, Southwold Surgery also agreed to pass its unwanted medicines to Kessingland.

This latest initiative comes just a couple of months after retired GP Jane Murphy, who lives near Beccles, successfully organised an appeal for vital stores and equipment for victims of the tsunami in south east Asia.

Annual Parish Meeting 21st April 2005

Approximately 50 residents attended the Annual Parish meeting where the Chairman, Alvin Hunt, reported on the activities of the Parish Council throughout the year. The main issues had been planning, of which there had been a record 33 applications. He stated that on planning matters the council had performed well, in that most of their views concurred with the final decision of the Planning Department.

He stated that repair works to the Village green had progressed and more were to be carried out later in the year. New posts had been installed 'round Stocks Green and offenders written to, in the hope that the green will be preserved. The Jubilee seat is to be repaired and the bus shelter is to have a new thatched roof. He thanked Robin Buncombe for his support as Vice Chairman and the Clerk for all her work despite her illness. He thanked the Councillors for their support and then stated that he was standing down as Chairman this year, having completed four years in the chair.

Discussions took place on Traffic Calming and recycling in the village. It was generally supported that the new measures suggested by the Highways Department should be implemented. The majority also supported having a recycling centre in the village, if a suitable site could be found.

There were also reports from the Common Lands Charity Trust, District and County Councillor Rae Leighton, The Village Hall Management Committee and the Police. Finally local groups and societies gave very interesting reports of their activities throughout the year, including a fascinating report by Adam Burrows, from English Nature, on the progress of wildlife around Walberswick.

Report from the AGM of the Parish Council on 9th May 2005

Robin Buncombe was unanimously elected as Chairman to the Parish Council and Madeline Dabbs to Vice Chairman. Alvin Hunt was given a vote of thanks for his work as Chairman over the previous four years.

<u>Planning</u> – The Parish Council opposed an application for a two-storey extension to Chestnuts, Moorside (Councillors K Webb and A Hunt declared an interest and took no part in the discussions) but had no objections to a summer house at Beta Cottage (Councillor K Webb also declared an interest in this application) and a rear single extension at Kermont, The Street. An appeal by the owner of Rose End, against the decision by the Planning Authority to refuse permission, would be held on Thursday 26th May. Councillor Hunt agreed to attend the meeting on behalf of the Parish Council.

The new Traffic Calming signage plan had been received from the Highways Department and it was unanimously agreed to go ahead with these measures. (A positional plan can be seen on the Village notice board)

Concerns were voiced about damage being caused to the thatch on the Jubilee seat. Councillor Hunt agreed to look into possible means of prevention. Concerns were also voiced on potential damage to the Village Green as the result of building work. The owners would be approached on this matter.

Southwold Surgery Helps Patients Around The World

Pharmacists at Southwold Surgery are helping restore the health of people in developing countries by sending unwanted medicines to clinics worldwide. They have linked up with the Christian organisation Emmanuel Healthcare to pass on medicines that have been returned to the surgery by patients who no longer need them.

Head Dispenser Maxine Hunt said: "Patients return a number of medicines for which they have no further use, such as prescription drugs and painkillers. NHS guidance states we cannot reuse them or issue them to patients in the UK. So this is a perfect solution and one which benefits needy people around the world, in places where medicines may be in short supply."

Also, any patients with unwanted medicines, old spectacles or medical equipment could take them to the surgery in York Road to be passed on to the charity.

Emmanuel Healthcare has strict guidelines about what can be accepted – no controlled drugs, morphine, loose pills or anything with a shelf life of less than six months left in them are accepted. Qualified doctors and healthcare professionals sort the items, before dispatching them to any one of 20 clinics worldwide.



July Parish Council Report

Planning Applications:

Opposed: (1) Demolition of existing single dwelling and replacement with two new semi-detached houses at 'The Studio', Stocks Lane, on the grounds that the plot was the smallest in the vicinity and two such dwellings would result in over-massing and be out of character in an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. (2) Replacement of the existing timber windows and doors at 'Martins', The Street, with UPVC, as the dwelling was in the Conservation Area of the village.

The Parish Councillors were extremely upset to learn that the appeal lodged by the owners of 'Rose End Cottage', had been allowed. Councillor Hunt, who spoke at the appeal, stated that he felt the decision had gone the appellant's way once the Inspector had visited the site, which had been allowed to get into a state of disrepair over the last two years. Councillors were upset at the loss of the shop and the fact that the unique character of this part of the village would be lost forever.

The accounts for the year ending 31st March 2005 were approved by the Council and would be sent to Lubbock Fine to be audited. Mr Tony Kohn had already carried out an internal audit of the accounts.

Councillor K Webb was re-elected as Nominative Trustee for the Common Lands Trust and would serve for a further four years.

Planning - 1, Moorside: The Parish Council had no objections to the erection of a single storey extension, but was concerned about the proposed conversion of the garage to a utility room as this could cause the loss of a parking space.

Blythwyc Cottage, The Street: The Parish Council had no objections to the erection of part two-storey and part single-storey side/ rear extension and replacement garage.

Manor House, The Street: There were no objections by the Councillors to the extensions to create a single residential property.

The Parish Council and other residents were very disappointed that Walberswick's most original and distinguished Arts and Crafts garden path had been removed from Marsh End without any reference to the Historical Society or English Heritage. The Council would like to ask residents in older properties in the Village to refer to these bodies before removing anything that maybe of historical interest.

Concern was expressed that static caravans were being placed on properties without planning permission. This would be referred to the Planning Department. Concern had also been expressed about the safety of the building at Lampland, Stocks Lane. It was agreed to contact Building Control at Suffolk Coastal.

The Jubilee seat was in the process of being repaired. The post supporting the village sign needed replacing. This would be treated as a matter of urgency and removed as soon as possible.

Parish Council Report - 3rd October

<u>Planning</u> – Permission has been granted for a single storey rear extension and first floor balcony to Winfield House, Stocks Lane and for the erection of part two-storey and part single-storey side/ rear extension and replacement garage at Blythwyc Cottage, The Street. 2 Anchor Cottages has also been granted permission to build an extension to form a dining room and bathroom on the first floor. A planning appeal has been made to the Secretary of State following the refusal for permission to build a pair of semi-detached dwellings and two detached garages on the land at The Studio, Stocks Lane.

Works to the Bailey Bridge – Suffolk County Highways Department will be carrying out essential repairs to the Bailey Bridge, over the River Blyth, in November. It is understood that the bridge will remain open to pedestrian traffic except for short periods (of 30 to 40 minutes duration) when it will be necessary to close the bridge for safety reasons. (For further information see Parish Council notice board outside Village Hall).

Emergency Plan – The Chairman, Robin Buncombe and Vice Chairman, Madeleine Dabbs, have been working on an 'Emergency Plan' for Walberswick over the last few months. Councillor Dabbs has now formulated a letter and questionnaire, which will be sent out to every household in the near future.







WCPL is a limited liability company controlled by a Board of Directors, which is appointed by Walberswick Common Lands Charity (WCLC). The Board of WCPL is solely responsible for the profitable operation of the car parks and is required under its Memorandum and Articles of Association to covenant its entire profits to WCLC. Its Board currently consists of Rae Leighton (Chair), Ben Cardwell, Mary Clayton, Alvin Hunt, Michael Vaughan and David Webb. Angela Vaughan is the Secretary

WCLC is a charitable trust, which is controlled by a Committee of seven Trustees, four of whom are nominated by Walberswick Parish Council (WPC) for a four-year term. The current Trustees are Kate Goodchild (Chair), Brian Fisher, Nigel Hunt, Barbara Priestman, Gerald Tooley, David Webb and Wally Webb.

WPC consists of seven Parish Councillors democratically elected every four years.

Currently they are; Robin Buncombe (Chair), Maddy Dabbs (Vice Chair), Alvin Hunt, Nick Jones, Brian Tibbles, David Webb and Wally Webb. Vivien Hunt is the Clerk.

WCLC is finally responsible for the allocation of any charitable grants. Neither WCPL nor WPC has that right or responsibility, and the fact that some individuals serve on more than one of the bodies does not invalidate the formal structure.

Keeping the Common Special

Speak to someone who lived in the village sixty years ago, they will tell you that then the Common was heath land, covered mainly in heather and that the inhabitants had worked the impoverished sandy soil for many centuries. Until the 1900s, flocks of sheep trampled the bracken and nibbled off young tree saplings, villagers collected plants for medicines, kindling and building materials and rabbits were part of their diet.

Heath land habitats are rare and, since they have not been subjected to modern agriculture, they support a range of rare flora and fauna. If they are not managed they will be lost. Walberswick Common is one of these important heaths and is a 'site of special scientific interest'.

Over the previous decade there has been an increasing threat from birch and willow saplings, gorse and bracken. In 2002 the Common Lands Charity developed an annual management programme, which is approved and funded by English Nature. Amongst other things it now involves the use of mechanical plant to clear the large areas and volunteers to carry out the smaller tasks. Heather seed lies dormant for a long time and can become reestablished within a few years. The aim of the Charity is to achieve that ideal combination of heather and gorse that existed previously.

If you would like to help, the volunteer working party meets in the Church Lane car park on Wednesday afternoons at 2.15 p.m., commencing the 9th of November.
