# Walberswick, People and Houses, 1870-1930

Edward Wright has written an enjoyable and informative book called *Walberswick, People and Houses, 1870-1930*, which costs £15. The decades each side of 1900 saw the creation of large unique houses and the arrival of interesting and often eccentric families to live in them. This book tells their story, and the story of the people already here. Each of the 24 chapters covers a different person or family, and the colour illustrations from the Walberswick Scroll enable the reader to connect the houses to their occupants. Some of the characters will be familiar to readers of *The People of Millfield Road* but there is also much new material. It is well worth a read.

The Scroll is showing its age (nearly 100 years old) and recently had some much-needed repairs. Edward is generously donating £10 from the sale of each of the first 150 copies of his new book towards the cost of the ongoing conservation work.

# Wine bottles along the B1387

The litter left alongside the B1387, the road between the water tower and the village, is pretty much in line with the national litter problem in rural areas, the most prolific items being food packaging, confectionery wrappers, single-use coffee cups, and soft and alcoholic drinks containers made from plastic, tin or glass. Bits of plastic and the odd vehicle part are also common along the B1387. However, we do seem to have a particular problem with empty wine bottles. White wine is the preferred tipple with around 40 bottles, the majority with the same label, collected in the last six months. This isn't new and reflects the hauls of previous outings. According to the Campaign to Protect Rural England, the chances of a bottle in a hedgerow being collected are almost zero, so we are fortunate that the village has dedicated volunteers who regularly litter pick the B1387, the beaches, the footpaths, and the town. **Editor**

# **Play equipment**

### **Voter ID for Local Elections on 4 May**

The Government has introduced a new requirement for voters to show photo ID when voting at a polling station at some elections. This will apply for the first time in England at the local elections on Thursday, 4 May 2023. You can read more on the Village website at <a href="tinyurl.com/ybzmxmx7">tinyurl.com/ybzmxmx7</a>. If you don't have the correct type of ID you must apply for a Voter Authority Certificate before 25 April 2023 or you will not be able to vote in person, the alternative being a postal vote.

### **Neighbourhood Development Plan**

Thank you to all those who came along to the last consultation session in the Heritage Hut. We received great feedback on the work completed and valuable input on things such as extra green spaces and the local views to protect using the Neighbourhood Development Plan. The last large piece of work being done for us by external specialists (on the built environment) is due for delivery in the next few weeks and we should then be in a position to start drafting the document for submission to the District Council. More updates and consultation to follow as that work progresses.

### **Permanent Christmas tree on the Green?**

At its February meeting, the Parish Council (PC) considered a proposal, mostly on environmental/sustainability grounds, to plant a tree on the Green near the Heritage Hut that could be used as the annual Christmas tree. The PC resolved that it was minded to do so, subject to consultation. Once specific proposals have been drawn up, the PC will consult with the village before making a final decision. ### **Environmental Stewardship**

The season seems to have passed in a blink of an eye; the end of February marks the end of major works on the Common, or indeed any of the Charity's lands where increasing biodiversity is the priority. Recently you may have noticed some areas have been rotated to create bare ground - an important part of the heathland mosaic and vital for reptile and invertebrate species. Last week also saw the tractor on site cutting small areas of heather to stimulate pioneer growth, as well as cutting bracken and grass to reduce dominance and encourage other species to flourish. A lot of bird, reptile and invertebrate action will now commence and much of it will be at low level. If we can bear this in mind - on heath, fen, reed and salt marsh - by treading lightly and keeping the dogs on leads - we stand a good chance of being rewarded.

If you have access to *Suffolk Natural History 2022*, (Transactions of The Suffolk Naturalists' Society, Vol. 58) there is a great article (Land use and biota of the heathlands of Suffolk Sandlings 1020 - 2020) by Patrick Armstrong. It will be on line eventually.

The Charity has been given a sapling oak from Royal Windsor; it will be planted to both mark the late Queen's Platinum Jubilee and the long service to WCLC by Jayne Tibbles who, sadly, recently passed away.
