Bird Song Walk

Sunday, 5 May 2024. Interestingly the first walk started 40 years ago in 1984. In 2024, the day dawned bright but very misty. At its meeting in May, Cllr. Andrew Lewis was elected unopposed as Chair for a further year and Cllr. Rebecca Whiting was elected unopposed as Vice-Chair for a further year.

Illegal parking on the Village Green

There is an ongoing issue of vehicles parking on the Village Green, particularly trade vans and trucks of those working on the houses surrounding the Green. We have had similar issues with the Jubilee Seat Green. There is no parking of any kind allowed on the Green except in very special circumstances such as an organised public event for which permission has been granted by the Parish Council. The Parish Council will be putting up a no parking sign so everyone is aware and to help reduce the damage that this illegal parking is doing to the Village Green. We also would like to ask homeowners to help by ensuring that their workers and visitors know that no part of the Village Green can be used for parking. If anyone sees inappropriate parking, please photograph the vehicle registration plate and make a note of the colour and make of the vehicle concerned. Recording any company name and contact telephone number that may be displayed is also helpful. These details should then be reported to East Suffolk parking enforcement at tinyurl.com/7ydw6nuy.

Harbour Consultation

East Suffolk Council, the owners of Southwold Harbour, has been working for a number of years on a document called a Harbour Revision Order, which is intended to help modernise and consolidate Southwold Harbour statutory powers. These powers include such items as clarity on the limits of the Harbour; the composition of the Board and the establishment of an advisory body. It also gives modernised powers of management and financial control such as establishing a reserve fund, development and disposal of land, and ability to grant tenancies. There is a statutory 42-day public consultation underway that closes on 15 June. Anyone interested is entitled to respond. Details on how this can be done, along with the full set of documents, is available on the Government website at tinyurl.com/2ex6444k.

Walberswick Wildlife Watch survey

The survey, organised by WALL (Walberswick against LionLink), is now gathering pace. The aim is to gather data on wildlife in and around Walberswick that we can use as part of our campaign against Walberswick being chosen as the landfall for the National Grid Ventures (NGV) LionLink project. Although NGV will undertake their own studies, we think these will be very limited and we want to put forward our own case about the environmental impact of LionLink with as much evidence as possible.

Initially, the main focus of the survey (or rather surveys), will be on bats, birds and reptiles, mainly around the landfall site, Manor Field, and the cable corridor across the fields towards the Water Tower near the A12. Thereafter, we will be widening the area out towards the Common and Marshes.

We have already started deploying reptile mats around Manor Field. These heat up in the sun and encourage reptiles, such as adders, grass snakes and slow worms, to bask on or under them. Please do not touch or lift these mats unless you are part of the survey team. If you see any reptiles on or near the



mats, please note the date and number and contact the survey team (contact details below).

We are also installing electronic bat detectors in trees and on posts and buildings at various locations. The detectors are small green boxes that are normally quite hard to spot, but if you see any, please do not interfere with them.

We will be relying on more experienced birders to carry out the bird surveys. However, anyone can use the Merlin App (merlin.allaboutbirds.org) to identify birds when they are out and then record the sighting on the iRecord App (irecord.org.uk/app). Not only is it very straightforward and educational but also good fun. Every record will help our defence of Walberswick.

We have also installed pedestrian counters on various footpaths around Manor Field to help us compile data on the extensive usage of the footpaths in the locality for use in the campaign. Access to these paths would be severely disrupted by the LionLink project. The devices only collect footfall data. Feel free to walk past the counters when you are out and about.

Please help us with this survey work. We already have some volunteers to help us with the reptile, bird and bat surveys but we would welcome more. Walberswick Common Lands Charity



If you are interested in bird song but have not heard about the app called Merlin (merlin.allaboutbirds.org) it's worth a try. Nightingales and nightjars, chiffchaff, willow warbler, blackbird and robin, there is plenty going on and each habitat offers a different mix. Amazing to have this on our doorsteps.

Meanwhile, those of you who visit the bird hide may have noticed the very red infestation of azolla in the ditch, an invasive, non-native species that trustees have been researching and monitoring for some time. Fronds grow rapidly and block out light as well as reducing available oxygen. Natural England has agreed for it to be treated with a natural biocontrol, weevils, and the season commences at the end of May. We are working with CABI (cabi.org) which researches, breeds and distributes the weevils.

Cliff Field has been cut and the brambles reduced as this permanent semiimproved grassland needs to be managed in an attempt to recover populations of summer marsh orchid and a target sward height of 15cm in August. It will be cut again in September and scrub control increased.

June Kitchen and Garden

June is arguably the most rewarding and spectacular month in the garden. It is also the ideal time to plan your entries in the Horticultural and Culinary Show on 20 July. Soft fruits such as gooseberries, rhubarb, red, white and blackcurrants will be ripening, and the first sowings of vegetables will be ready to harvest by the end of the month. Many annuals can still be sown in June, and in July borders will be full of flowers such as roses, sweet peas, hardy perennials, flowering shrubs and clematis. All the above are categories in the show. To help things stay healthy and to ensure the longest possible growing and flowering season, feeding, watering, and dead heading are essential. Make sure everything is well supported and staked.

In the kitchen it is not too late to make relishes, cordials and some liqueurs.
