#### **Internal Audit**

The internal audit of the 2023/24 accounts for Walberswick Parish Council has been completed and the results were discussed and approved at our June meeting. We are delighted to say that it is another excellent audit for the Council and all the required governance documents were also considered and signed at the June meeting. The next steps are the public inspection of accounts, which is now underway, followed by submission of all documents to our external auditor, PKF Littlejohn. The outcome of that is expected in the autumn and will be reported both here and on the Parish Council website. #### Signage for River Footpath, Village Green and Jubilee Green

Following discussion at the May meeting, the wording of proposed signage was agreed at the June meeting of the Council and will now be purchased and installed in an attempt to stop illegal parking on both the Greens and cycling on the river footpath, along with signage to make clear that dogs are not allowed in the toddler play area on the playing field.

### **Early results of the Walberswick Wildlife Watch Survey**

Early results from the Walberswick Wildlife Watch Survey on both reptiles and bats show interesting findings. The boundary of Manor Field\* is being used by a significant number of bat species, including the specially protected barbastelle bat, while the reptile count indicates that the site qualifies as a key reptile site.

The first bat analysis, conducted over five nights, identified seven to nine species with an approximate average of 1,000 calls per night. The most common species recorded were the soprano pipistrelle, followed by the common pipistrelle (these are the commonest bats in the UK), noctule, barbastelle, Nathusius' pipistrelle (possible), serotine, Daubenton's bat (possible), Natterer's bat and the brown long-eared bat. The Nathusius' pipistrelle still needs to be confirmed as it can be confused with the common pipistrelle. Similarly, the Daubenton's and Natterer's bats can be confused with one another.

The identification of the barbastelle bats was not a surprise as, although they are an endangered species and protected under Annex 2 of the European Habitats Regulations, they have been recorded on the nearby Walberswick

National Nature Reserve and are relatively common in East Anglia. However, knowing they are using Manor Field is important in relation to the LionLink proposal and its potential impact, as is knowing that the field boundary is used by an important assemblage of bat species and by a large number of them.

The results of the reptile survey over 15 days in June revealed an exceptional population of slow worms and good populations of common lizards, adders and grass snakes. The highest single counts have been 52 slow worms, eight common lizards, six adders (four adult) and six grass snakes (one adult). Because Manor Field supports three or more reptile species, two snake species, and an exceptional population of one species, it qualifies under the Froglife Trust's Amphibian & Reptile Conservation protocol as being a key reptile site.

The reptile mats are now being moved further west, although some will be left in-situ to provide extra habitat around Manor Field. There are also eleven mats around the caravan site where grass snake, adder and lots of slow worms, as well as a water vole, have been recorded.

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
