#### COMMON LANDS CHARITY

Working with Natural England, the Charity proposes to trial a new method of managing our beautiful Common. For two months (January & February) sheep will be allowed into a fenced enclosure around the Fen to see if they can help control the growth of silver birch, thereby substantially reducing the need for herbicides. Sheep have been used in this way since the Middle Ages, creating diverse landscapes and rich wildlife habitats. No official footpaths will be affected, the flock will be checked regularly and a contact number will be displayed.

The Trustees have again made Christmas donations to local schools, hospitals, health care organisations and other bodies that serve the Village.

After analysing responses to the questionnaire on the future of the Pavilion, the Trustees concluded that there is insufficient demand to re-build it. However, there may be the case for a permanent shelter for the benefit of parents supervising children.

The Charity owns Robinson's Marshes, which were flooded on 5 December after being breached by the tidal surge in three places. The Environment Agency has said it will repair these breaches but it is not clear whether they will continue to do this in the future. The Trustees are investigating a 'self-help' solution to preserve the Marshes and footpath from the Ferry Hut to Bailey Bridge for the long term, as they are such an important amenity to the economy of the Village and its residents.

#### RECENT FLOOD DAMAGE

The storm surge in the first week of December caused considerable damage to the Village's surrounding environment, but property damage was far less than that experienced by some other communities along the East Coast. The peak water level was higher than that in 2007 but was still 4 feet below the flood defence walls. It was not just the height of water that caused the damage, but rather the speed at which the surge engulfed the area.

Water entered the ground floors of properties at the end of Ferry Road and also the huts by the ferry, leaving behind thick silt that will have to be cleared. Beach huts around the camp site were moved and damaged. The camp site, Cliff Field and the caravan site were covered in reed litter to a depth of 2 feet. The dunes and shingle ridge have been badly eroded and towards Dunwich the ridge has been breached, causing more water to enter the marsh each high tide. The Blyth river wall on the Walberswick side has been breached near the Ferry Road car park, opposite the Harbour Inn and to the west of the Bailey Bridge: as a result the marshes between here and Blythburgh have been flooded, and flood water came within 3 feet of properties at the bottom of the Lea. The marshes of the Nature Reserve between here and Dunwich are badly damaged with bridges and board walks being torn up and reed beds flattened.

Fortunately the Environment Agency moved fast to fill the breaches in the river bank, and had machinery in place to start work less than one week later.

#### PARISH COUNCIL MEETING 2 DECEMBER 2013

Open Forum Session. The Parish Council received questions relating to bank accounts held; the size of precept set for 2014-15; the future of the Heritage Hut; and putting the EELGA report on the Parish Council website.

Temporary Clerk's Report. Actions undertaken on behalf of the Parish Council included: adding updates to the Allotments, ICO decisions and Planning Applications sections of the website; generating and displaying Parish Councillor and Parish Council Clerk vacancy advertisements; contacting Walberswick Groups re the future of the Heritage Hut; the Christmas event on 23 December; trial ban of dogs on the beach; and ongoing monitoring of the financial position. At 2 December the Parish Council had available finances of £14830.12.

Councillors then discussed the budget for 2014-15, with the agreement to accept and approve the updated budget proposal of £14185, a reduction of £4856 over the 2013-14 budget; changes to the Bank Mandate; Annual Return Audit invoice; Broadband (the cabinets were due for upgrade in June 2014); training for new Councillors; interview procedure for the Clerk and Parish Councillor; Christmas event, Carols on the Green; trial ban of dogs on the beach; and the future of the Heritage Hut.

<u>Planning applications received</u>. Sunningdale, The Street: fell Cupressus Macrocarpa with heavy lean for safety reasons. Lu Shan, Millfield Road: reduce crown of Eucalytus by 3-4m to avoid building contact. The Parish Council discussed these and raised no objections to either of the applications. Cllr Haslegrave was appointed the Tree Warden for Walberswick.

Finally, Cllr Gower asked that speeding in the Village be added to the agenda of the next meeting.
